Free Food Give-Away from Cornell Cooperative Extension

This is not the same as the Food Express which is available on a monthly basis. This is a separate program and is available due to our community being in a "Food Desert". These programs are a wonderful thing and is a boon not only to our community, but also the local farmers who participate with these programs.



The farmers receive revenue from the State for their products, Cornell Cooperative Ext. organizes the delivery and we get to benefit from this. Happy 10-year anniversary, Rhonda!!



Tuberculosis Epidemic Hits Home, Part II

(Continued from the August Bookworm)

Both Gilbert and Laura attended school at the hospital and both earned their high school diplomas there. They also were given part-time jobs at the facility, when they became teenagers.

Their school and work schedules were very similar to those the Job Corps students now follow.

"We spent half a day working," Mr. Skinner says.

Mrs. Green remembers her teachers well. "The late Alice Payne Page (a Cassadaga resident) was my elementary teacher and Sadie Perham, who later became a teacher at Cassadaga Valley Central High School, taught us our high school courses," she says.

What was it like to spend the holidays at the hospital, particularly Christmas?

Mrs. Green and Mr. Skinner have warm remembrances.

"One year, when I was about 14, Miss Josephson asked four of us to go into the woods to cut a tree. We brought one back that must have stood 15 feet tall. It barely fit into the room. We have to decorate the top, before we set it up, because we didn't have a ladder tall enough to do the job with the tree upright.

"It was wonderful; all the kids helped decorate it and I can still remember the ornaments they made for the tree," Mr. Skinner says.

Mrs. Green remembers the gifts the children received from area organizations. "They weren't all that elaborate, but they were nice," she says.

Both also recall entertainment programs including minstrel shows provided by Swede Hill resident from Jamestown and silent movies.

Mr. Skinner and Mrs. Green were among a countless number of young people who stayed at the Children's Pavilion until the hospital was closed in the late 1950s after effective cures for and the prevention of tuberculosis was developed.

"We really enjoyed our visit to the center this past fall and the chance we had to see the place again. It's obviously changed, but that's to be expected," Mrs. Green.



Cornell Chautauqua Grow Program Sees Success and Keeps Growing...

Cornell Cooperative Extension of Chautauqua County is excited to share the success and growth of its pilot program Grow Chautauqua funded via the USDA and NY State Department of Agriculture and Markets New York Food for New York Families initiative.

Launched on June 12th, the program has partnered with several food access and community organizations to bring local, fresh produce items and food products directly to community members at no cost.

Distributions occur weekly at the Ripley Library as well as locations in Jamestown, Dunkirk, and Chautauqua County Rural Ministries.

So far this season, CCE has distributed over 50,000 pounds of locally grown, raised and produced products. Per the NYFFNYF program, farmers and food producers are compensated full market value for all products, which are then distributed in designated 'low-food access' areas, or parts of the county where individuals face difficulties acquiring fresh, local produce due to transportation barriers, cost, or factors such as age or race.

Farms and businesses who have contributed product to the program include: Yerico Farms, Roberto Fred Farms, Feinen Farms, Maggitti Farms, Miller's Apples, Stand Fast Farm, all from Dunkirk; Sunshine Honey-Sherman; Degolier Maple Products and Roo Haven, both from Forestville; JM Joy Farms and Enjoyable Acres of Fredonia; Abers Acres-Kennedy; Amanda Byler-Frewsburg; Eden Valley Creamery-South Dayton; Ellicottville Greens-Olean; Green Heron Growers-Panama; Carli Cook-Stockton; Clymer Produce Auction- Clymer, Lizzie Byler-Frewsburg; and Bit-o-Breeze Farm and Snowbelt Gardens of Jamestown.

Produce is delivered by farmers to main partner Brigiotta's Farmland Produce & Garden Center where it is packaged for distribution. Other items are offered on a rotating basis and include beef or pork products, cheese, fresh baked bread, jams and jellies, eggs, and maple syrup or honey.

"The program has always been about increasing food access, first," says Community Food System Coordinator Linea Haskin.

The program is also a benefit for local farmers, many who struggle to find consistent markets for their products. Derek Yerico of Yerico Farms shares, "It's a win-win... helps the community but it also gets the farm nice orders...like many, this year has been tough. We are honored and thankful to be a part of the program."

All community members are welcome to receive a Grow Chautauqua box weekly, at no cost with no ID or income eligibility requirements. Boxes are first come first served.





They let someone in charge know they need help.
